INSTRUCTIONS

Use this record book for all the things you do in 4-H this year. You may also want to keep a scrapbook for your ribbons, certificates, and programs from your 4-H year.

Put your record book in a binder or folder. Write your full name, club name, 4-H level (*Junior, Intermediate, Senior*), and the 4-H year (*e.g. 2023-2024*) on the cover.

Separate each section of your record book with a labeled divider (*Calendar, Project Record, Permanent Record, 4-H Story, Supplemental Info*).

Use your records to look back at your progress during the 4-H year. This will be helpful when you make plans for next year.

When you complete your 4-H program for this year, write your 4-H story.

This record book is your personal work. Do your best to keep it current as the year progresses.

1. My 4-H Planning Calendar:

- · Record the dates of all club and project meetings.
- Record the dates for County Achievement Night, Public Presentation Contest, Spring Fair and/or Super Saturday, and Skagit County Fair.
- Mark all meetings/events you attended.
- At your leader's discretion, you may also insert calendar pages given to you by your leader instead of using the calendar pages in this book. You will still need to mark which meetings/events you attended.
- **2. My Project Record:** You will need to complete a Project Record for each project in which you are enrolled.
 - Project Commitment: To be completed at the beginning of the 4-H year. Write 2-3 goals for what you want to learn this year, then sign and date. Leaders and parents need to review your goals, then sign and date as well.
 - Project Journal: Check with your leader as most projects use Add Sheets instead of the Project Journal. If your project uses Add Sheets, write "See Add Sheets" on your project journal page(s). You do not need to complete the Project Journal.

If your project uses the Project Journal:

- Date. This is a log of your actions. Keep it up-todate
- What did you do or make? List, in order, the things you did or made (purchased supplies, cooked dinner, taught my dog to heel).
- How much?/How many? How much did you buy? How many people did you serve? If this column doesn't apply, leave it blank.
- Cost. What was the total cost of the items you purchased? If you used feed or other materials given to you by others, estimate the cost. For many other things you do, such as teaching your dog to heel, there will be no cost or income.

- Income/Value. What was the amount you received for items sold, or the estimated value of items you made or raised that were used at home?
- Time. Estimate the time you spent on this action related to your project. For some activities you may want to summarize weekly or monthly hours spent.
- Comments or what you learned. Briefly tell what problems you had, things you learned, and how you feel about what you did or made.
- Project Photos. Choose two pictures to include that show you working on your project during the 4-H year. Pictures can be from club or county events and shows. Write a caption that describes what is happening in the picture.
- Project Highlights. Look back at your goals for the year. Did you learn what you planned to learn? What problems did you have to solve? What were your main successes? What would you do differently if you did it again, knowing what you know now?
- Financial Summary. Check with your leader because most projects use Add Sheets instead of the Financial Summary. If your project uses Add Sheets, write "See Add Sheets" on your Financial Summary page. You do not need to complete this page.

If your project uses the Financial Summary, this page will help you summarize your project's financial value, what you spent, and what your earned during the year. It summarizes your project journal. Do an inventory when you start your records each year and when you close your records. The difference between what you own from the start to the close of the project is part of your profit or loss for the year.

- Project Add Sheets. If your project uses Add Sheets, include them at the end of your Project Record.
- 3. Permanent 4-H Record: You will use the same Permanent 4-H Record every year you are in 4-H to record your activities and contests. Write the year (e.g. 23/24) and at least one entry per page. If you don't have anything to write on a given page, write the year and "None". Your Permanent Record should match the entries in your Project Journal and/or Add Sheets. See the Skagit County Record Book Guidelines for more information about filling out your Permanent Record.
- **4. My 4-H Story:** Follow the prompts on these pages to complete your 4-H Story. Do not repeat anything from your *Project Highlights*. You will introduce yourself, tell about your project, tell about your 4-H club activities, events, and community service, and tell about how 4-H has influenced and/or changed you.
- **5. Supplemental information:** This section is related to your club, community, and/or school. It is limited to two sides of one page. Include at least two pictures. You can also include newspaper clippings and/or letters if appropriate. All items need a date and caption describing them.



YOUR 4-H YEAR AGREEMENT

At the beginning of each year, leaders, members, and parents should agree on expectations for member participation in the club.

We suggest the following:

- Attend a certain number of club meetings.
- Attend a certain number of project meetings.
- Serve as a committee member or officer.
- Do a public presentation.
- Keep a record book.
- Learn some new skills and knowledge.
- Have an exhibit. Work on a community service project.
- Do leadership activities.
- Participate in an out-of-club activity such as camp or conference.
- Be creative. (This is the leader's and member's opportunity to think of other things that could contribute to the 4-H experience.)
